About A Better Start

A Better Start is the ten-year (2015-2025), £215 million programme set-up by The National Lottery Community Fund, the largest funder of community activity in the UK. Five A Better Start partnerships based in Blackpool, Bradford, Lambeth, Nottingham and Southend are supporting families to give their babies and very young children the best possible start in life. Working with local parents, the A Better Start partnerships are developing and testing ways to improve their children's diet and nutrition, social and emotional development, and speech, language and communication. The work of the programme is grounded in scientific evidence and research. A Better Start is one of five major programmes set up by The National Lottery Community Fund to test and learn from new approaches to designing services which aim to make people's lives healthier and happier.

The National Children's Bureau is designing and delivering an ambitious programme of <u>shared</u> <u>learning and development support</u> for A Better Start, working within, across and beyond the five partnership areas.

Our aim is to amplify the impact of these programmes by:

- Embedding a culture of learning within and between the partnerships.
- Harnessing the best available evidence about what works in improving outcomes for children.
- Sharing the partnerships' experiences in creating innovative services far and wide, so that others working in early childhood development or place-based systems change can benefit.

Government updates

New Ofsted early years inspection handbook

Following a consultation with the early years sector, Ofsted has published a new <u>early years inspection framework</u> for registered early years and childcare providers which will come into force in September 2019. A <u>report</u> in Nursery World said the new framework had been 'cautiously welcomed' by the early years sector.

Government announces 'Chat, Play Read' campaign

The Department for Education has announced a new 'Chat, Play, Read' campaign, which encourages parents to communicate, read and play with their children before they start school. For the launch, freuds (a communications agency) helped create a new <u>follow-along video</u> for parents, featuring journalist Natasha Kaplinsky OBE (@kaplinskyn) and TV psychologist, Emma Kenny (@emmakennytv), to show that it is never too early to start interacting with your children.

New training for experts to boost early communication skills

Families with children who would benefit from additional help with their early speech and communication skills will have access to family reading sessions, local parenting pop ups and improved training for early years professionals, as part of a £6.5 million investment by the Department for Education so children have the language skills needed to thrive at school.

Government response to report on tackling disadvantage in the early years

The Department for Education has published a response to the Education Select Committee report focusing on quality early years education and a strong home learning environment. The response addresses the raft of recommendations made by the Select Committee on issues such as workforce development, service models, health in maternity, disadvantage and inequality. Call for more men to work in the early years

More men are to be encouraged into careers in nurseries and early years settings, in

a new project to provide more diverse role models for children before they start school. Children and Families Minister Nadhim Zahawi has announced a £30,000 grant to support the scheme and help provide more male role models for children in the early years. Find out more here.

House of Commons: Science and Technology Committee. Evidence-based early years intervention: Committee's Eleventh Report of Session 2017-19 (October 2018) and Government Response (February 2019)

Following on from work led by Graham Allen MP and others to highlight the substantial evidence base and need for investment in early intervention and support, the UK Government launched an inquiry in 2017 to review the extent to which the evidence on early intervention was informing early intervention practice. A Better Start is highlighted throughout the report, with several partnerships featuring as case studies. The Committee's report including recommendations for a new national strategy for adversity-targeted early intervention and the UK Government response to this report can be accessed via the links below.

Key enablers to establish an effective partnership-based early help offer: report Commissioned by the LGA, this research explores the enablers of, and barriers to, developing and sustaining an effective local early help offer. The findings are based on in-depth engagement with eight local areas which were selected on the basis of interesting or innovative practice in the area of early help. The report explores in detail how these areas have constructed their early help offers; how these have evolved over time; the key enablers that have supported the creation of an effective offer; and the future challenges that local areas are addressing. Engaging disadvantaged and vulnerable parents: An evidence review

This report sets out the findings from a rapid evidence review to understand what is known from the literature about encouraging disadvantaged and vulnerable parents to take up, fully participate in and complete parenting and parental conflict programmes and services. Find the report here.

Children's Commissioner: Early access to mental health support

The Children's Commissioner's research is the first time any organisations has collected data to show how much is being spent by areas in England on "low-level" mental health support for children. It reveals that local areas allocated a total of £226 million for low-level mental health services in 2018/9, just over £14 per child. Find the report here.

Five areas to focus on maternity and early years support

The <u>Early Intervention Foundation</u> has announced plans to work with five local areas on improving outcomes for children in the early years. The programme is based on using evidence and local intelligence to create a shared vision for maternity and early years services.

Sounds of intent in the early years: Soundabout report

This research from music charity Soundabout reveals that targeted music sessions for children in the early years and their families in areas of high deprivation can improve their capacity to manage their feelings and behaviour, boost their self-confidence, and heighten their ability to listen and pay attention, enabling them to 'close the gap' in terms of meeting their age-related expectations. The research also found that early years music workshops can help children with complex needs to overcome developmental delays. Find the report here.

House of Commons Health and Social Care Committee. First 1001 Days of life: Thirteenth report of session 2017-2019
