### ABS

ABS is a £215 million programme funded by The National Lottery Community Fund (The Fund), the largest funder of community activity in the UK. ABS works with families so they can play an active part in deciding upon, and designing, the ABS services and support they receive so that they can give their babies and very young children the best possible start in life.

There are five ABS partnerships in Blackpool, Bradford, Lambeth, Nottingham and Southend-on-Sea. These partnerships are working with parents to improve babies and young children's diet and nutrition, social and emotional development and speech, language and communication.

ABS is place-based and aims to create approaches, relationships and services that better support people can communities to thrive. A key element of ABS is to bring aobut systems change; that is to change, for the better, the way local health, public services and the voluntary and community services work together with parents and communities to improve outcomes for children.

#### The ABS national evaluation

The ABS national evaluationn is being undertaken by the ABS national evaluation team led by the National Centre for Social Research (NatCen) with the following partners: University of Sussex, Resarch in Practice, the National Children's Bureau and RSM UK. The national evaluation runs from April 2021 until March 2026. The national evaluation aims to: support ABS partnerships to improve delivery outcomes throughout the lifetime of the programm; work with local ABS evaluation teams to avoid duplication of evidence and enable collation of local evidence; and enable The Fund to confidently present evidence to inform policy and practice initiative addressing early childhood development. The ABS national evaluation has four objectives:

- 1) To identify the contribution made by ABS to the life chances of children.
- 2) To identify the factors that contribute to improving children's life diet and nutrition, social and emotional skills, and langauge and comunication skills.
- 3) To evidence the experience of families through ABS systems.
- 4) To evidence the contribtuin made by ABS to reducing costs to the public purse relating to primary school aged children.
