A Space & Place Grantee's perspective

Top tips on applying for funding

Applying for a capital grants programme is a fantastic opportunity for community groups, especially rural groups, to improve their community resources and assets. The application process can be a daunting challenge and there may be many hurdles to negotiate but one small rural grantee to the programme has taken the time to carry out some self-reflection on their successful application. The group have provided a few tips for other applicants which gives the Space & Place team an early insight into a grantee's perspective of the programme.

Be Confident! - In what you are asking for. If you work out your needs, running costs and look at other examples, you should be confident (§ your sustainability of the project). Don't be greedy.

Be Patient! - It takes a lot of time and commitment to get the application done. You need to be prepared to commit a lot of personal time and energy.

Be Open to Change! - There can be a lot of development between Stage 1 and Stage 2- you are asking better questions; your community consultations and surveys may have changed for the better; and your beneficiaries needs become more developed through stronger surveys.

use support available! - A supportive committee will go a long way to helping. Also having two people who know the project inside out is good so you can bounce off/ support each other

Gain the local council's support! - The local Council have been very supportive from a funding and staff time perspective, as over the years we have built up a great relationship with the Funding Officer who has signposted us to funding; helped us with applications; and therefore helped build capacity and skills so we are more confident to do it ourselves.

Partnerships work! - In the past we have helped other local groups with community projects (e.g. planting for an outdoor community gym).

Step back every now and then! - Sometimes you have to step back and take a breath- as sometimes you can be too close and not see the obvious (like linking up with the school which was suggested by the CFNI assessor)

'What Ifs'! - You are bettering thinking through all the scenarios possible to best avoid those little hiccups and pitfalls.

Be aware! That managing £350k of funding is a huge commitment when it comes to the financial and legal technicalities and issues.
