Organisation	Local Authority	Award	Project summary
Oban Addictions Support and InformationService	Argyll and Bute	£25,000	This three years of funding will enable the group to sustain their support service for young people with addiction and mental health issues in Oban and Lochgilphead in Argyll and Bute. The programme will provide support for 600 young people, with 50 people volunteering in programme activities.
Signpost Recovery	Clackmannanshire	£100,000	This group will use the funding to continue their providing support to children and young people across Forth Valley who are affected by a family member's substance misuse. The project will provide the children and young people with the necessary coping skills through a range of counselling, social activities and volunteering opportunities. The project will work with children and young people over two years.
Home-Start Wigtownshire	Dumfries and Galloway	£99,106	This group will use the funding to continue delivering family support groups in Newton Stewart, Stranraer and Sorbie. The groups will support parents with pre-nursery aged children to develop positive parenting skills and increase their knowledge of issues such as behaviour, routines, health and wellbeing. A range of activities will also be offered at the groups including storytelling, gardening and a programme of guest speakers.
Kate's Kitchen	Dumfries and Galloway	£100,000	This group will use the funding to continue providing support, social activities, and food for vulnerable and isolated individuals in the Annandale & Eskdale to help reduce social isolation and support people to take back control of their lives. Over the next three years, the project will work with 600 people, supported by 60 volunteers.
Dundee Carers Centre	Dundee City	£326,563	This group will deliver activities and one to one support sessions to carers in Dundee with topics covered decided, by carers themselves, based upon their needs and interests. The project will be an opportunity for carers to recognise and build upon the skills they have developed in their caring roles, whilst providing a space where carers can share experiences and breakdown feelings of isolation. The project will support 500 carers over a period over the next three years.
Our Community Kitchen	East Lothian	£100,000	This group will use the three years funding to deliver their community kitchen which brings people of all walks of life together to eat home cooked food. The project run three times a week and benefits local people in the community who are isolated and vulnerable. The project will also contribute to helping to reduce 'holiday hunger' by working with schools and the local area partnerships to offer free freshly cooked food to children and families during the holidays.

Strathcarron Hospice	Falkirk	£285,855	This group will expand and develop their 'Compassionate Communities' project, building resilient communities to provide appropriate locally-based support to people living with a long-term condition , carers and the recently bereaved. Activities will be aimed at reducing isolation and improving the quality of life for people affected by long-term conditions. Over the next three years the group will work with approximately 2,500 people, supported by 30 volunteers.
Tamfourhill Tenants and Residents Association	Falkirk	£268,267	This group will recruit two development workers who will lead two separate but linked workstreams. One will ensure that community groups in Camelon and Tamfourhill continue to flourish past the end of the Our Place programme and the other will centre around the theme of community safety, which has been repeatedly highlighted as a local priority. Over the next three years with project will work with 200 people, supported by 30 volunteers.
Fife Women's Aid	Fife	£63,044	This group will use the funding to employ a full-time Family Support Worker to work directly with children, young people, and their mothers or carers following incidences of domestic abuse. They will also reduce isolation by encouraging engagement with peers, community and services. The project will work with 120 people over 2 years.
The Fife Council	Fife	£341,859	This group supports people who have experienced domestic abuse by giving advice on housing options which are available and providing safety equipment, which is fitted free of charge. They also run a befriending programme to help survivors regain their confidence and build new friendships. Over three years this activity will work with 90 people and 70 volunteers.
A Place for Change	Glasgow City	£75,000	This group will use the funding for their Throughcare project in the North of Glasgow which supports people serving short term sentences on their release. It will offer a range of volunteering opportunities and a chance to take part in local community projects to help reduce the cycle of offending.
British Deaf Association	Glasgow City	£88,715	This group will use the funding to continue delivering their 'Deaf Roots and Pride' project, supporting deaf children and young people aged between eight and 23 years of age. The project will provide one to one support and activity days, helping young people to build their confidence and aspirations for key transition points in their lives. Over three years the project will support 240 young people and 20 volunteers.
Common Wheel	Glasgow City	£51,990	This project will use the funding to deliver music-based workshops for young people aged 16-25 years of age who are being supported through their first episode of psychosis. Over the next three years the project will work with 80 young people.
Free Wheel North	Glasgow City	£53,000	This group will use the funding to continue their woodworking therapy project for people experiencing loneliness and isolation. The project will provide opportunities for people to develop or improve their woodworking skills, and to work towards positive destinations such as volunteering, further education and employment. Over the next two years the project will work with over 100 people and 30 volunteers.

Geeza Break	Glasgow City	£385,903	This group will use the funding to deliver a family support service for parents living in the North East Glasgow who have a child or children under 16 years of age The project will offer families intensive one to one person centred support. The project will work with 402 people and involve 6 volunteers over the next three years.
The Reidvale Neighbourhood Centre	Glasgow City	£99,000	This group will use the funding to run a programme of activities aimed at improving the quality of lives of local people in Dennistoun, Glasgow. Activities will be focused on developing skills for employment, tackling poverty, improving health and fitness, inspiring young people, increasing social connections, and nurturing interests. Over the next three years the project will work with 2,600 people and 60 volunteers.
THE SPACE	Glasgow City	£129,755	This group will work with up to 360 families who are experiencing poverty. They will provide a range of support including a drop in service providing crisis support, a range of community integration activities and home visits as and when needed.
Time and Space	Glasgow City	£90,000	This group will use the funding to provide support for those who hear voices and self-harm and activities will include peer support groups, information sessions on coping tools and mechanisms, and one to one counselling. Family members and carers will also able to access support and, over the next three years, the project will work with 130 people.
Highland Third Sector Interface	Highland	£303,818	This project will provide support for people at risk of offending or who have experienced their first time in custody. The group will engage three staff to help them link into activities, services or support available in their communities that will help them avoid a cycle of re-offending.
Getting Better Together Ltd	North Lanarkshire	£315,287	This three-year award will be used to continue the group's 'Shotts and Wishaw Friends Together' befriending service which supports socially isolated older people by helping them to maintain their independence and to re-engage with community activities. The Service will engage with 636 people and 50 volunteers from the Wishaw and Shotts areas within North Lanarkshire.
LANDED Peer Education Service	North Lanarkshire	£120,476	This volunteering programme will recruit, train and support young people to become volunteer peer educators. The programme will focus on young people who may be at risk of developing problematic lifestyles to help raise awareness of the risks and consequences of negative lifestyle behaviours and give them the skills and confidence to help build their aspirations and look to the future.
Kibble Education and Care Centre	Renfrewshire	£148,850	This group will use funding to deliver their two-year Nurturing Young Lives programme, supporting young people in care through a range of therapeutic activities including play and art therapies. The project is based at Kibble's new Forest View School Campus which can support up to 40 young people aged between 5 and 12 years old.
HIV Scotland	Scotland	£76,612	This group will use the funding to develop and expand their 'Positive Person's Forum', which brings together the voices of people living with HIV across Scotland. The forum acts as a peer support network and, each year, produces a manifesto that highlights the main issues people living with HIV face to help develop new services, shape strategy whilst also advocating for those affected by discrimination. They will also se up an online network to connect those living with HIV.

Hawick Congregational Community Church	Scottish Borders	£24,476	This group will use the funding to provide a range of social groups and wellbeing activities to people experiencing barriers to inclusion and social isolation in Hawick. The project also provides a low-cost lunch club which caters for around 60 people each week and also provide volunteering opportunities for people unable to take up mainstream volunteering opportunities. Over the next three years the project will benefit 300 people and work with 36 volunteers.
Home-Start Stirling	Stirling	£51,837	This group will use the grant to provide support services to families within the Stirling local authority area who are experiencing difficulties from one to one support in the family home to a parenting skills programme covering topics from budgeting to cooking. The Family Support Coordinator provide will also support to the volunteers as well as delivering direct support to families.
West Lothian Drug & Alcohol Service	West Lothian	£87,924	This group will use the funding to continue their 'Grief Matters' service which provides bereavement support for young people aged between 12-18 years of age. The service will support young people who are dealing with an unexpected bereavement through group work and individual counselling.
